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Revd. Canon Miriam writes:

Dear Friends,

Happy New Year!

At whatever point in January you are reading this letter, we will still be in the season of Christmas which is why we still have our Nativity Crib in place in church. In the secular world Christmas is deemed as over once Boxing Day has passed and many people take down their festive decorations soon after. Some may keep them up until 12th night. In church our celebrations of the birth of Jesus do not end on Boxing Day, the celebration of Christmas for us, has only just started and will continue until we celebrate The Presentation of Christ in the Temple on 28th January. There are lots of pictures and information about the services and activities we had in the lead up to Christmas further on in this magazine. I hope you enjoy looking and reading about them. It has been amazing few weeks and such a wonderful opportunity to welcome people into the church. Thank you so much to everyone who has worked so hard to enable all of these activities to take place, you are heroes, we could not have had the wonderful services and activities without you. There are too many of you to name here but please accept my very grateful thanks for all that you have done.

The New Year starts with the season of Epiphany, the arrival of the wise men. Despite what the images on some Christmas cards portray, the wise men did not arrive in the stable alongside the shepherds but much later. In fact they wouldn't have visited the stable at all as Jesus was probably near the age of two when they arrived. When we think about it this makes sense as their journey from the east would have taken many, many months. This is why they have their own feast day called Epiphany which falls on 6th January. These men from foreign lands arrive bearing gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh, each gift a symbol of who this child really was, a king, a Messiah, a suffering servant. We will be celebrating Epiphany on Sunday 7th January at

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our 9.45am service. In the evening of that day we are having Carols and Christmas Cocktails, a chance to come together and sing our favourite Christmas carols, there is a list for you to add your favourite carol at the back of the church. I do hope you will be able to join us and bring a few friends too.

Also, on January 21st at 3.30pm we will be hosting the annual ecumenical service to mark the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, do pop this in your diary and come along if you can.

As we start this new year I pray that you will all know that God is always with you, his love, like a blanket, enfolds you and surrounds you in all that you do and in all circumstances that you may find yourself in .

Report from the PCC Meeting 6th December 2023

The Church Organ

The PCC is seeking to have the organ re-tuned and to investigate options for improving its electrical controls, which are deteriorating. These matters are being actively pursued.

The Sanctuary Carpet

The red carpet between the altar and the steps to the nave is in poor condition and needs replacement. The PCC resolved to replace it with a carpet of the same colour.

Finance Report and 2024 Budget

Our Treasurer, Andrew, reported that All Saints' is on course to achieve a small surplus of income over expenditure for 2023. This is a welcome £12,000 improvement on the original budget. The biggest contributors were increased Offertory giving, donations and Gift Aid receipts, the Beer Festival, the Christmas Market and Prize Draw and donated receipts at the Friday Cafés. The PCC is grateful to everyone who gave so much in terms of their time and money to help to achieve this result.

Andrew's proposal for the 2024 budget, which PCCs are required to approve by 31st December 2023, included forecasting an end-year deficit of £3,720, which achieving incomes higher than those forecast would eliminate. Uncertainties included levels of inflation, energy and contracted services costs and levels of Hall hiring income. The PCC adopted the proposed budget without amendment.

Hall Hire Fees for 2024

The PCC considered levels of fees recommended by the Hall Committee to be charged for bookings of the Hall by outside organisations or bookings for private parties. The Hall Committee had taken account of charges for other local halls and facilities. Most fees would not change but fees for full use of the Hall to include the kitchen for cooking would increase to reflect higher energy costs. Costs for hire of the Committee room would not rise. Three months' contractual notice would be necessary for regular hirers of the Hall but new fees for one-off bookings could start on 1st January 2024. The PCC adopted the fees proposed by the Hall Committee for 2024.

Safeguarding – Safe Use Of Images Policy and Lone Working Guidelines

The PCC conducted a two-year review of its Safe Use of Images

Policy and resolved that no changes were required to the existing policy. If the parish wishes to publish photographs of any child or vulnerable adult it will request the consent of parents or guardians via completion of a consent form.

The PCC also received and adopted guidelines for anyone working alone on Church property or visiting people in their homes. The guidelines include advice for handling and ending meetings, assessing risk and informing another person of meetings arranged away from the Church.

Anne Oke and Sam Jones, the Safeguarding Team, have designed a child-friendly safeguarding poster which will be displayed in the children's area of the Church and in the Hall.

Communion Assistants

Jane Bates, Fran Bennett, Alick Burge, Richard Hall, Sam Jones, Anne Oke, Chris Oke and Lyndon Palmer were confirmed to continue to administer the chalice at the Sunday and Thursday communion services. In addition, Miriam was authorised to instruct and appoint those children she judged to be both capable and willing to serve as communion assistants from henceforth. Young Ian Galloway had administered the chalice on a trial basis at the communion service on Sunday 5th November. PCC members confirmed that feedback they had received from the congregation had been entirely positive.

Meetings Calendar for 2024/25

The PCC adopted the calendar of meetings for the PCC, the Finance and Standing Committee and the Annual Meetings until May 2025. PCC meetings will be held on Wednesday evenings in the Committee Room.

Committee Reports

Buildings – Delays have occurred with progressing various repair works but the Buildings Committee will continue to pursue them. It will also investigate installing a lockable exterior pot box for the Parish Office and the cause of water ingress into the hall boiler room.

Hall – The carpet company V Penney has kindly offered to replace the existing stage carpet at no cost to the parish. New lighting for the hall entrance is being investigated, with possible replacement of the notice boards.

Pastoral and Evangelism - The 8am communion service will be moved from the first Sunday to the second Sunday of each

month; to be publicised in the magazine. Members were very pleased that Nerys Jones and William Hilton-Dennis had received their first communion.

Social and Fundraising — There will be a Carols and Cocktails Evening on Epiphany Sunday 7 January, at which refreshments will be served.

Advent Service Sunday 3rd December


Everybody said what a wonderfully moving service this was.

On Christmas Eve, the Croxley Mummers toured Croxley Green to perform their version of George and the Dragon (with a few topical additions!).


Their first performance was in All Saints' Church Hall to a packed audience. Great fun was had by all before the Mummers continued on their way.



11th January: Mary Slessor of Calabar

Courage, vision and leadership are found in the most unlikely of places. Mary Slessor was born in December 1848 into a wretchedly poor family.

Her father was an alcoholic who lost his job as a shoemaker. Mary was the second of seven children, and in 1859 they moved from Aberdeen into the fetid slums of Dundee. Her father and mother worked in the mills, and Mary joined them there when she turned 11.

When Mary's father and both brothers died of pneumonia, Mary's mother struggled on to keep Mary and her two sisters alive. By the time Mary was 14 she was doing a 12-hour day as a jute maker.

But life was not all drudgery. Mary's mother was a devout Christian who read the family Bible to her daughters, and also the *Missionary Record*, a monthly publication from the United Presbyterian Church. The stories of the missionaries captivated Mary. When she heard that David Livingstone, the great missionary explorer, had died, she decided that she would follow in his footsteps. She wanted to devote her life to taking the gospel to Africa. She was 25.

In August 1876 the Presbyterians sent her out to Calabar, Nigeria, an area where no European had ever yet set foot. With her red hair and blue eyes, Mary grabbed attention wherever she went, but despite recurring illness and constant danger, Mary settled happily among the tribes. She learned their traditions, quickly becoming fluent in their language, Efik. Soon she won the confidence of their tribal leaders. She taught their children and was soon determined to put an end to some of their barbaric practices, such as the killing of twins (whom they thought were evil).

Over the years Mary put an end to many witchcraft practices, and she adopted every twin child she found abandoned. And she talked endlessly about Jesus Christ, the passion of her life.

Mary was tough – she made long trips through the jungles and took canoes up remote rivers. When her shoes gave out, she went barefoot. Her great passion was to go to 'the regions beyond' with the Gospel. She thrived in places and among people who would have terrified most women in her day.

It has been written of her: "Practically singlehanded she tamed and transformed three pagan communities in succession. It is a question if the career of any other woman missionary has been marked by so many strange adventures, daring feats, signal providences, and wonderful achievements." (Dr Robert H. Glover, *The Progress of World-Wide Missions.*)

When in 1901 Southern Nigeria became a British Protectorate, Mary was appointed the first ever female Magistrate in the British Empire. She became a skilful diplomatic emissary.

She was known for saying: "It is not Mary Slessor, but God and our united prayers that have brought the blessings to Calabar. Christ shall have all the honour and glory for the multitudes saved."

When she finally died of fever in January 1915 the native Christian girls and women wept bitterly: "Our mother is dead. Everybody's mother has left us."

Mary Slessor once wrote to a friend who had long prayed for her: "I have always said that I have no idea how or why God has carried me over so many funny and hard places, and made these hordes of people submit to me, or why the Government should have given me the privilege of a Magistrate among them, except in answer to prayer made at home for me. It is all beyond my comprehension."
