

Dear Friends,

We had great fun at the Quiz Night on 19th April as each table battled to win the first prize or, depending on the team confidence, the losing

table award. We were treated to a lovely curry cooked by Wendy and her team which as always went down very well. Thank you Wendy and the team for the hours spent in the kitchen cooking and then serving the food in the evening. A big thank you to Ben and Sarah Guest who organised the whole event. It was a great success and we really appreciate the hard work, time and energy that they put in to ensuring it was such a great evening. We raised over £1500 for Church funds.

Some years ago, the Archbishops of Canterbury and York launched an initiative to encourage people to pray for church growth called 'Thy Kingdom Come'. This has now become a global event. Each year, between Ascension Day and Pentecost (which is 10 days) we are encouraged to pray for church growth and also to commit to praying every day for up to five people who we would love to come to faith in God. This year Ascension Day falls on Thursday 9th May and Pentecost falls on Sunday 19th May. Starting on 29th April we will be using the 2014 Thy Kingdom Come reflections at our livestreamed worship on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. These are also available to download from the Thy Kingdom Come website. I wonder who you will commit to pray for during this time? Do also remember to pray for our church growth as well. It has been lovely to see so many new people join us over recent months, God is truly blessing us, so please do not stop praying for God to give us wisdom as we seek to continue growing his church here in Croxley Green.

The Deanery Ascension Day service will be held at St Mary's Church Rickmansworth starting at 7.30pm. It would be lovely to have a good representation from All Saints' attending so do come along if you can. On 19th May, not only will we be celebrating Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit on the disciples which led to the beginning of the Christian Church, we will also be welcoming Revd. Paul as he reaches the end of his curacy and is licensed as Assistant Priest here at All Saints' by Bishop Jane, who is the Bishop of Hertford. It is so lovely that Revd. Paul has decided that he wants to continue in ministry here at All Saints'. He has blessed and enriched us with his gifts over the last three years as a curate and we really look forward to this continuing into the future. Revd. Paul will be licensed during the 9.45am service. I do hope that you will be able to come and be part of this service on this very special day for him and us. World Day of Prayer Friday 1st March 2024

The themes for World Day of Prayer are chosen seven years in advance and prepared in the first few months of the specified year. Palestine was chosen for 2024 with the theme "I beg you bear with one another with love".

This theme could not have been more appropriate following last October. The Churches Together in Croxley meet together to organise the preplanned service. We all found the task quite emotional and touched us far more than planning any other previous service.

The service focused on Peace using Psalm 85.

The service booklet provided a background history of Palestine which was really helpful and inspired me to investigate further. I have a copy of the service which people may wish to borrow.

The following prayerful reflection summed up the whole service;

Put peace into each other's hands Put peace -it requires action Lord. Prayerful action Not hoping for something, yearning for something, even praying for something but actively doing something.

And put peace into each other's hands Lord? But what about my view point and opinion? Because to put something into someone else's hand means Giving it away, not holding onto what is mine, letting go.

It might be a bit easier If I knew I would be giving to those I know and love, Those who I trust. But what about the 'other' those who are different from me? those I don't agree with? those who I am not sure I can trust? My thoughts, viewpoint, hopes, prayers-given away. And as I stand, momentarily empty handed, how do I feel?

There is a vulnerability in giving, offering, peace.

Will it be rebuffed? mocked Or accepted? welcomed? Put peace into each other's hands And like a treasure hold it

Like a treasure hold it. A reminder Lord that this is something precious, This gift of peace we give to each other.

Having given, can I recognise its worth? Can I treasure it? Indeed, can I even accept it?

That's not so strange a question as it may seem, Because, again, it'd be from those I know and love. Those I trust. But can I receive from the 'other'? those who are different from me? those who I don't agree with? those who I am not sure I can trust?

Surely one of the most significant parts of the parable of the Good Samaritan lies in the wounded traveller accepting help, care and provision from one of the Samaritans who were so despised-

> very definitely –"the" the "different" the "I don't agree with them" the "I never trusted them".

Giving and receiving peace requires generosity of spirit, openness and trust, as well as the humility to accept. It's a precious thing then!

Lord, grant us grace to Put peace into each other's hands And like a treasure hold it. Amen Jane Bates

Ignatian Spiritual Exercises

Dear friends,


Following on from a deeply reflective Holy Week I hope this letter finds you renewed in awe and wonder of all Jesus did for you, and questioning how you might continue to go deeper in your discipleship. The journey of Lent maybe over but, as disciples, we continue to explore how we can continue to grow deeper in our relationship with God.

Many of you will be aware I am currently in my first year training for ordination. As part of my training, I was privileged to go on a 3-day silent retreat which was 'An Introduction to Ignatian spirituality.' I had done a little reading before the retreat and have continued since my return. I thought it would be helpful to share some of my experiences over a couple of articles as Ignatius has a lot to offer us as we seek to journey ever deeper with God. I hope you find the following contains some useful insights

that will allow you to experiment in your spiritual life.

Who was Ignatius of Loyola?

Ignatius was born in 1491 in Basque Spain. He served as a soldier and was keen to achieve power and status in life. His desires were hindered when a cannon ball smashed into his leg resulting in a long and challenging recovery requiring



his leg to be broken and reset. Whilst recuperating he asked for a book to read and the only one available was on the 'Lives of Saints' and 'Life of Christ' and so began his journey of faith. He acquired a spiritual guide, and seeing God as his teacher began to keep a journal. The collection of his writings, as he sought to journey deeper with God, is available to us in the form of the Ignatian Spiritual Exercises. When talking about his exercises Ignatius says we should use them if they are helpful, and this is advice we should heed in our spiritual lives as we seek to find that which draws us into a closer relationship with God. I would like to share one idea you might like to try.

The Examen

This is an opportunity to look at where God is active in our lives. We replay the events of the day looking for his presence. Maybe this is in creation, a conversation or a smile from a stranger. God is interested in meeting us exactly where we are, so we come to this honestly, bringing all of our emotions and feelings from the day and we look for guidance and forgiveness for the things we get wrong.

There are many versions of the Examen, and it can be done in different orders, so it may take experimentation to see what works for you.

Below are 5 simple steps to help you explore God's presence in your day.

 \cdot Begin by replaying the video of your day. As you reflect, consider if any strong emotions arise, these may be positive or negative and may guide the next steps.

 \cdot Can you find times where God was present in your day? Remember, this may be in unexpected ways.

 \cdot Then give thanks, even if you are struggling to see God active in your day, for he is always there with you.

 \cdot Next, say sorry for all the things you feel you didn't do or say, for the ways you acted in situations that maybe were unkind or unhelpful.

· Finally looking forwards, ask God for his help, guidance and support with tomorrow.

I would encourage you to try this a few times before deciding if it is working for you or not. It becomes easier to sit and remember the stages after a few tries and then flows as a practice better. Do let me know how you get on with it, I would love to chat to you more about Ignatius and your experiences of the Examen.

All in the month of May from Parish Pump

It was:

200 years ago, on 7th May 1824 that the first performance of Ludwig van Beethoven's Symphony No. 9 took place in Vienna. It is regarded as Beethoven's greatest work and is one of the most-performed symphonies in the world.

150 years ago, on 29th May 1874 that the British writer G. K. Chesterton was born. A novelist, short story writer, philosopher and critic, he was best known for his Father Brown stories.

100 years ago, on 4th May 1924 that the British children's writer E. Nesbit (Edith Nesbit) died. Best known for *The Railway Children*.

90 years ago, on 25th May 1934 that the British composer, Gustav Holst, died. Best known for *The Planets*.

70 years ago, on 6th May 1954 that Roger Bannister became the first person to run a mile in under four minutes (3 minutes, 59.4 seconds), in Oxford.

Also 70 years ago, on 20th May 1954 that Bill Haley & His Comets released the song *Rock Around the Clock*. It brought rock and roll into the mainstream and is regarded as one of the most important records in music history.

Also 70 years ago, on 29th May 1954 that Diane Leather became the first woman to run a mile in under five minutes (4 minutes, 59.6 seconds), in Birmingham.

60 years ago, on 2nd May 1964 that Nancy Astor, American-born British politician died. She was the first female Member of Parliament (MP) to take her seat in the House of Commons.

50 years ago, on 24th May 1974 that Duke Ellington, American jazz pianist, composer, and big-band leader, died. Regarded as the greatest jazz composer of the 20th century.

Also 40 years ago, on 19th May 1984 that John Betjeman, British poet, writer, and broadcaster died. He was Poet Laureate 1972-1984.

30 years ago, on 6th May 1994 that the Channel Tunnel linking England and France was officially opened.

16th May Caroline Chisholm, helping the emigrants to Australia

If you want an example of someone who can show you their faith through their works, Caroline Chisholm is a saint for you. This doughty little 19th century English woman had such a compassionate heart that she

helped tens of thousands of people, from India to Australia.

Caroline was born in Northamptonshire in May 1808. Her father William was a pig dealer, and already had 15 children, by four wives. When Caroline was about five, her father brought a poor maimed soldier into the family home and urged his children to look after the wretched man well, as he had fought for their freedom. This disinterested compassion for a poor struggling 'outsider' would become the lodestar of Caroline's life.

In 1830, when Caroline was 22, she married Captain Archibald Chisholm, of the East India Company Army. Out in Madras, Caroline grew alarmed for the young girls growing up in the barracks. She founded the Female School of Industry for the Daughters of European Soldiers, to provide a practical education.

After having two sons and working on the Indian subcontinent for a number of years, Captain Chisholm was granted a two-year furlough in 1838 on grounds of ill health. The family moved to the sunshine of Australia, near Sydney. Here Caroline was appalled at the conditions that faced emigrants, especially female, arriving in the colony. Many ended up working the streets, just to survive.

Caroline stayed for seven years in Australia, placing more than 11,000 people in homes and jobs, and in all, her Female Immigrant Home helped more than 40,000 people. Highly respected by the government, she gave evidence before Legislative Council Committees, but accepted money from no one. When Archibald left the army in 1845 he and Caroline toured Australia at their own expense, collecting more than 600 statements from emigrants that detailed the truth about the problems of emigration.

Back in England, the statements caught the attention and respect of Charles Dickens, the House of Lords Select Committees, Lord Shaftesbury, Sir Sydney Herbert, Wyndham Harding FRS and even Pope Pius IX. Caroline and Archibald went on to help more than 3,000 people safely emigrate to Australia, before moving back there themselves, where they both died in 1877. In his novel *Bleak House*, Charles Dickens is said to have partly based the character of Mrs Jellyby on Caroline Chisholm.


Board meeting


