#### **Revd. Canon Miriam writes:**

Dear Friends,

So here we are, halfway through Lent already (or even further on depending on when you are reading this magazine). I wonder how your Lent

journey is going? Has it fallen by the wayside like good intentioned New Year resolutions, or are you really feeling the pinch with regard to keeping your Lenten discipline of not eating cake (or whatever you have given up), or keeping a set time apart each day to read and pray? Our journey through Lent is not meant to be easy. Lent calls us to Reflect on deepening our relationship with God, Renew our commitment to living out our faith in our daily lives, Repent of the wrongs that we have done against God and other people and resolve to do better, Receive God's forgiveness and Rejoice in the depth of love that he has for each and every one of us. A love that Reveals itself on the cross and through the amazing Resurrection of Jesus. In many respects Lent points us to a solitary journey but being a Christian is not something we can do alone. The early church points to the importance of the community of believers who worship together, pray together, grow together and journey together. This Lent and Holy Week we really want to encourage everyone to recognise the importance of being a part of the worshipping community at All Saints' and supporting one another as we journey and grow spiritually as a church. At the start of Lent we introduced the Prayer Buddy scheme. Please remember to not only pray for your prayer buddy each day but to check in with them when you see them in Church to see how they are getting on with their Lenten journey and also share where you are too. When we can share how God is working in our lives (or even when we feel God is absent) we enable the work of the Holy Spirit to touch us all in ways that are unexpected and powerful. Not only that, we find encouragement from each other, we become more open and aware of God at work in ourselves and in others and it draws us closer together as individuals and as a community.

The journey through Lent is both spiritually and emotionally charged and we experience this especially during Holy Week. Journeying together through the highs and lows of the last few days of Jesus' earthly ministry brings with it an amazing sense of unity, love and support which overflows in joyfulness as we celebrate Jesus' Resurrection on Easter Sunday so I really want to encourage you to participate as much as you can in the different services and activities during Holy Week. It will have such an amazing impact on you personally and spiritually and I would not want you to miss out on this.

Holy Week starts on Palm Sunday 24th March. At our 9.45am service of Holy Communion we will remember Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, the joy of the crowds as they shouted and rejoiced at the arrival of Jesus waving palm branches and laying down their coats. We will all receive a Palm Cross and, weather permitting, process outside the Church. In the evening, at 6pm, the choir, along with the choir of St Paul's Church Chipperfield, will lead us in the Cross of Christ Service. This service of beautiful music and traditional Passiontide hymns provides an opportunity for reflective worship as we prepare ourselves for the week ahead.

Journeying with Jesus through Holy Week is not simply about being an onlooker, it is about engaging with the events in a personal and spiritual way and each day during Holy Week there will be a service to assist you in this.

On Monday 25th March, at 7.30pm, there will be a short reflective service in Church which will focus on healing and reconciliation. There will be an opportunity for people to receive the laying on of hands and prayers for healing at this service.

On Tuesday 26th March, at 7.30pm, we gather in Church for our Holy Week meal. Picking up lots of the elements of a Passover Meal, this time of fellowship and worship enables us to gain greater understanding of the words used by Jesus which feature in our services of Holy Communion: 'Jesus blessed you Father for the food...he took bread, blessed it... and gave it to his disciples saying "Take, eat. This is my body given for you" after blessing the cup of wine he shared it with his disciples saying "Drink this all of you... this is my blood of the new covenant, shed for you all...drink this to remember me..." The meal is a joyful event as Passover Meals are so it is a fun evening with lovely food. There will be a sign-up sheet in Church nearer the time if you are able to come.

On Wednesday 27th March, at 7.30pm, there will be a short reflective service in Church which will focus on anointing, remembering how Jesus himself was anointed by a woman. There will be an opportunity for people to receive the sacrament of anointing if they wish.

On Maundy Thursday 28th March, there is a service at St Albans Cathedral at 11am where Readers and clergy from across the Diocese attend to renew the promises that they made at their licensing/ ordination. The Bishop will also bless the Holy Oils to be used in churches across the diocese for anointing those newly baptised, confirmed, the sick and the dying. This service is open to everyone, and each church is encouraged to take along people from their congregation. It is a beautiful, uplifting service and I encourage you to come along. There will be a sheet out nearer the time so that we can arrange lifts.

In the evening, at 7.30pm, we have our service of Holy Communion with the washing of feet and vigil. For this service the Altar is placed in the nave with the congregation sitting round it to bring to the fore the intimacy of the last meal that Jesus had with his disciples before his arrest. We remember Jesus, kneeling down and washing his disciples' feet. Paul and I will wash the feet of those present who would like this. (For those who feel uncomfortable there will also be an opportunity to receive this gift of love through having their hands washed instead). After Communion, the Altars are stripped and all colour removed from the Church. At the end of the service the choir lead us (in a non-formal way!) singing the Taizé chant 'Stay here, remain here with me, watch and pray' to the part of the Church that has been set up as a garden (to represent Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane) where we can sit and keep vigil for as long as we wish. The vigil ends at 10pm. This is a deeply meaningful and deeply moving service, I do hope that you will be able to join us.

Good Friday starts with the Ecumenical Walk of Witness. Beginning at 9.30am outside the computer shop in Watford Road (opposite the Co-op) we walk through the village with stops on the way for readings, short reflections and hymns finishing at the Methodist Church for Hot Cross buns. This is a lovely opportunity to stand side by side with or fellow sisters and brothers in Christ from the churches of Croxley Green as our Christian witness to the Croxley Green community.

In the afternoon, at 1.30pm, we will have a series of reflections in Church written by Archbishop Steven Cotterell called The Nail. Unlike recent years, these reflections will take place in the Nave of the Church and there will be no walking or prayer stations. The reflections focus on the individuals involved in the crucifixion of Jesus as they argue their case for not being the one to blame for Jesus being crucified. I do hope that you can join us for this.

Saturday takes us to Easter Eve and another vigil. This time there is a sense of expectation as we listen to Bible readings, sing Taizé chants and light candles to reflect Jesus rising from the dead, his light coming back into the world. It is a service that starts reflectively and moves into joyfulness as we proclaim 'Alleluia, Christ is Risen!' We journey to the font, a symbol of New Life (lighting candles on the way), where we renew our baptism vows and, with the sprinkling of water that has been blessed- we rejoice! Lent is over! Jesus is Risen!

Easter Sunday is our great celebration of Jesus rising from the dead. The 9.45am is a joyous service as we celebrate Jesus' victory over death, He has risen, Alleluia!

After the service we have our traditional Easter Egg Hunt in the Church garden.

With my love and prayers as you journey through Lent and celebrate Easter,

## **Sunday Coffee Charity**



UNICEF in the UK

The United Kingdom Committee for UNICEF (UNICEF UK) is a UK registered charity that

raises funds for UNICEF's emergency and development work around the world and advocates for lasting change for children worldwide. This includes, for example, working to change UK Government policies and practices that are harmful to child rights in the UK and internationally. UNICEF UK is one of 33 UNICEF national charitable organisations based in industrialised countries.

In the UK, UNICEF UK works with the hospitals where children are born, the schools where children learn and grow, and the services that shape their lives, to make sure that every child has the same chance to shine.

In 2020, they helped nine out of 10 maternity units across the UK, supporting around 600,000 new babies as they enter the world. Around 1.5 million children go to schools that are becoming Rights Respecting, building an environment where every child is safe, respected and nurtured. And they are working with local governments in all four nations of the UK to help make our cities and communities places where all children, especially the most vulnerable, feel safe, heard, nurtured and able to flourish.

All over the world, including here in the UK, UNICEF promotes and protects the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child.

UNICEF works with partners and supporters to raise funds, promote children's voices and create lasting change for children.







I saw an advert for the Trek26 event online and, after looking into it, I decided to enter. As Mum was diagnosed with Alzheimer's a number of years ago, I wanted to raise some money to support the charity which had helped support us through their information, leaflets and their helpline. Walking 26 miles or 13 were the options, so I thought that 13 would be a suitable target for the first walk. Events will take place across the country: Stonehenge, North York Moors, Lake District, Brecon Beacons, South Devon Coast, London and others – London seemed the sensible option, so I signed up. A friend is going to do it with me; she is walking for her mother-in-law who has dementia, so we will keep each other going.

The walk is on Saturday 18th May, through the centre of London. We start in Lambeth, walk along past Battersea Power Station, across the Thames, past the Tower of London, Somerset House, Royal Festival Hall, through Westminster, along The Mall, to Victoria, back across the Thames to Battersea Power Station and back to the starting point. It looks like an interesting route with lots to see as we walk. There are drink stops along the route, and snacks, and of course a medal at the finish line! Hopefully the weather will be kind to us and it will be an enjoyable day. It sounds like the atmosphere will be amazing and that will help us complete the walk.

If you would like to sponsor me, I will be setting up a Go Fund Me page (details to follow) but if you would prefer to give a cash donation please give it to me, Miriam or to the office in an envelope with my name and your name so that I can thank you. I know that the Alzheimer's Society will be very grateful for every penny we raise and it will continue their amazing work supporting others in similar situations. It really is vital and makes such a difference knowing someone is there for you at a really difficult time.

Many thanks for your support, and I look forward to sharing my medal with you!

## **Church Electoral Roll Revision**

The annual revision of the Church Electoral Roll will be made during the week of Monday 1st to Friday 5th April in preparation for the Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) on Sunday 28th April 2024, following the morning service.

If you are a lay person, baptised, are aged 16 years or older and resident in the Parish or, if not resident, you attend services at All Saints', you are eligible to be on the electoral roll as a lay member.

Existing members will remain on the roll unless they signify their wish to withdraw. Application forms for enrolment with an information pack will be available in the church and the Parish Office from Sunday 10th March onwards or can be obtained from me (contact details below).

Being on the electoral roll is important as it signifies a commitment to membership of All Saints' and enables you to vote for the election of members of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) and the Deanery Synod at the APCM and also to stand for election yourself. The PCC works with the Vicar to serve and run the Parish; it appoints committees and groups to manage particular areas such as worship, buildings and social and fundraising activities.

If you wish to be included on the electoral roll, please complete a form which you will find in a pack at the back of the Church or obtain from the office. Please place your completed form in a sealed envelope or hand it to Revd. Miriam, to me or to Judith in the Parish Office on or before Thursday 28th March (Maundy Thursday).

The revised list of those enrolled on the electoral roll will be available for your perusal at the back of the Church for two weeks commencing on Saturday 6th April, prior to the APCM.

On Maundy Thursday we recall the final command that Jesus gave to His disciples before His death. After the Last Supper, He rose and washed His disciples' feet. This was astonishing for a 'teacher' to do, but He had a firm purpose in mind: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.

In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis'. The word 'mundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command). The 'washing of the feet' ceremony was an important part of the medieval church's liturgy, symbolising the humility of the clergy, in obedience to the example of Christ.

## 9<sup>th</sup> March Savio the youngster who found God

A number of years ago the hit film *Slumdog Millionaire* touched millions of people with its story of a youngster triumphing against all the odds. Dominic Savio did the same thing. In fact, he is a good patron 'child saint' for children today who

struggle to get anywhere in life.

Savio (1842 - 57) was born into a poor family in Riva, near Turin. There were 10 children. The father was a blacksmith, the mother a seamstress. Somehow, they managed school fees, and when Dominic was 12, he was sent to the famous school of John Bosco at Turin.

A strict Roman Catholic school wasn't exactly the set for 'Who wants to be a Millionaire', but Savio loved it. He responded with enthusiasm to the wise and moderate spiritual guidance of Bosco, and began to grow. He was soon widely loved for his cheerfulness and friendliness to all. He was respected by fellow students for his mature, sound advice. Behind it all lay the key: Savio had discovered God for himself, and had responded with all his heart: one story of him tells how he was rapt in prayer for six hours continuously.

Sadly, Dominic Savio contracted tuberculosis. He accepted his disease with dignity and composure. He did not fear death – his deep and radiant faith assured him that something far better lay beyond.

Savio died aged only 15. He had never been a millionaire; his riches lay in his faith in Jesus Christ. The memory of this lovable lad lived on, so deeply had he touched the hearts of the people who knew him. Over 100 years later he was still remembered – and made a saint by the Roman Catholic Church.
