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## **July 2024**



### **Revd. Paul writes:**

Dear Friends,

Pentecost, on 19th May, marked the end of seven years of training; four of academic study and three with you as your Assistant Curate, as I was licensed

as your new Associate Minister. It was such an honour to have so many of you, along with friends and family, at my Licensing at our Pentecost service and to know that I will be continuing to serve with you in Croxley Green. I found it particularly moving to hear 'Come Holy Ghost', the song to the Holy Spirit, sung as I kneeled beside Bishop Jane. I find this piece of music particularly inspiring, and especially the opening words; 'Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire.' This hymn, traditionally sung at a Priesting, was not used at my service in 2022, so I was really happy that it was included.

These words; 'Come, Holy Ghost, our souls inspire' echo the waiting and discernment which we have been going through in the past months; watching and waiting for God's guidance to what He has planned for us next at All Saints'. At a recent General Chapter meeting, where all Clergy and Readers in the Deanery are invited to attend, we spent some time using the practice of Lectio Divina, a way of engaging with scripture that can help to discern a way forward. Miriam and I found this particularly useful and have decided to hold three sessions of Lectio Divina, at 7:30pm in the Committee Room on 27th June, and 4th and 11th July using the same passage which we reflected on, Luke 10, verses 1-11. Please join us for the sessions in July (I know that you will be reading this after the first session!) as we would love your thoughts. The sessions will only be around an hour and they are a great way of engaging with the Bible. You don't have to go to all three sessions, so if you can only make one or two dates, please come. And if you can't come, maybe just spend a few minutes with this passage and let Miriam or me know if anything in particular comes to mind about how God might be guiding us to the future.

Although I am writing before the event, I realise that the Revels will have taken place before you read this. I am sorry to have missed it this year and know that so many people put in a lot of hard work to make our stall such a success – thank you!

Looking forward to 10th July, we are really pleased to be able to welcome Dr Paula Gooder, currently the Chancellor of St Paul's Cathedral in London, as guest speaker at Rickmansworth Deanery Synod at 7.30pm St Mary's Church in Rickmansworth. This is an open meeting to which everyone is invited.

Dr Gooder is a fantastic speaker and is a writer and lecturer in biblical studies. Her passion is to ignite people's enthusiasm for reading the bible today by presenting the best of biblical scholarship in an accessible and interesting way. Her talk 'Ordinary people: Living extraordinary faith every day' will be really worth coming to. If you need a lift please speak to Miriam or myself.

As we move into the latter part of July and then into August we will be in the school summer holiday season. For some of us these are happy times of rest and relaxation, but we need to remember those who find the holidays difficult. Perhaps you'd like to pray this prayer through the coming weeks:

Loving and Gracious God, We put ourselves into your hands, and pray that you will bless us and our families during the wonderful months of summer. May we all help to make our home a place of relaxation, joy, love, peace and safety. We remember those who may feel isolated or lonely at this time and we pray for your blessing on them. ## **Eco-Church : Caring for Creation**

At All Saints' we are really proud that we have achieved the Bronze Level in A Rocha's Eco Church programme. We are aiming to achieve the Silver Level over the next few months and you will see some more articles in the magazine to help us focus on this goal and to help us to be more eco-friendly and environmentally aware.

The Eco-Church team met recently and we talked about what practical things we can do to reach our goal. One is to support a local environmental charity through our collection at coffee after our Sunday Worship. For the three months from July to September we have decided to support the Hertfordshire and Middlesex Wildlife Trust. The Trust is a local conservation charity working to protect wildlife and help people to connect with nature. With a team of volunteers, they care for wild places so that nature can thrive. They help people experience the wildlife on their doorsteps and to take action to protect it. They have an excellent web site at https://www.hertswildlifetrust.org.uk/ where you can read all about their work.



They also run brilliant events including Wildfest, which is on Saturday 13th July from 10am to 4pm and has activities for all. Enjoy a wild day out exploring nature in Cassiobury Park, taking part in fun activities and finding out more about organisations local the working for wildlife. Enjoy bird walks, nature crafts, discovering river creatures,

and more, whilst finding out how you can help support the amazing species that call this area home.

July is also recognised as plastic free July, a global movement that helps millions of people be part of the solution to plastic pollution – so we can have cleaner streets, oceans, and beautiful communities. The invitation is to be part of Plastic Free July by choosing to refuse single-use plastics. I wonder if this is something you could take part Please in? have а look at the web site https:// www.plasticfreejuly.org/.

During plastic free July it's also worth learning about how our plastics are recycled. Did you know that every piece of plastic has a PET code, numbered 1 to 8? The symbols look like this:



Code 8 is a recent addition and is for plastics which are completely non-recyclable. Many plastic food containers now have this code.

**Did you know that in Three Rivers, only plastics with PET codes 1, 2 and 5 are recyclable?** Have a look at your plastics the next time you're about to recycle them. If the PET code is not 1, 2 or 5 then your plastic has to go in the general waste bin and not your recycling. This may seem wrong – we all want to recycle more – but it can do more harm to out the wrong plastics in the recycling as it adds hours of manual sorting to remove the offending items.

Look out for more information on eco issues in coming issues of the magazine, including information on activities planned for September, which we are designating Environment Month, as we celebrate our Harvest Festival and look for other ways that we can be greener in Croxley.

# Let's Grow The Kingdom of God!

Our very own Associate Minister, Paul Palmer, gave us an interactive and thoughtprovoking talk at our Sunday 9.45 service on 16th June. The visual impact of his props and the help of four of our youngsters encouraged me to get my phone out to take a couple of photos!



Paul's talk, based on The Parable

of the Mustard Seed in Mark 4 verses 26-34, was about how we can play our part as the Kingdom of God. Paul had had to do some pruning of large branches overhanging into his garden, and he had brought them with him as his visual aid! He showed us the tiny 2 cm seed that the tree had grown from. A small mustard seed can grow into a great shrub (the case in the Bible lands), and Paul helped us



consider how a small 'seed' in us can grow into something big and special. As Carys and Nerys held the two big branches, Emily and William held up 5 signs that Paul asked us to consider 5 key words that we can work on to help grow God's kingdom, which he hung on the branches.

This was how these words stuck in my mind:

**Grow** – as Christians, we are here to grow the kingdom of God. *And how?* :

**Possibility** - trusting in what God can do through us when we have faith

**Kindness** –performing small, unexpected acts of kindness, which might cause people to stop and consider that there is something about this person being a Christian that they want to explore

**Pray** - a prayerful act can be so much more powerful.

**Hope** – this word was in a heart shape, because isn't Hope a sign of Love, and Love a sign of Hope?



All the youngsters in church that day then planted some mustard seeds to take home and nurture. They stuck this message on their pot: *The Kingdom of God is like a mustard seed that grows and grows and grows*.

## 7<sup>th</sup> July St Willibald the first ever Anglo-Saxon travel writer



Where do you go on your summer travels? If you enjoy including a Christian element to your trips, such as making a pilgrimage, or visiting places rich in Christian history, then St. Willibald (d. 876) is the saint for you this month. He was one of the most widely travelled Anglo-Saxons of his time.

Willibald began life in Wessex, becoming a monk at Bishops

Waltham (Hants). But he obviously had the curiosity that besets all keen travellers – what is it like over there...just over the next hill, round the next corner? And so Willibald set out... for Rome, Cyprus, Syria and above all, Palestine. It was an amazing achievement, just to survive such journeys back in the early 8<sup>th</sup> century.

In Palestine, Willibald made his way round all the Holy Places associated with Jesus, as well as the numerous communities of monks and hermits living there. On his eventual return to Europe, Willibald decided to tell his story. He dictated an account of all his travels to a long-suffering nun, Hugeburc, who wrote it up under the title of *Hodoeporicon* – the first ever travel book to be written by an Anglo-Saxon

After a long stay in Constantinople, the year 730 found Willibald back in Rome, where he settled at the monastery at Monte Cassino. Under his reforming influence, the monastery began to prosper. That got Willibald 'noticed', and soon Boniface asked Pope Gregory III to send him on to Germany, where Willibald was made bishop of Echstatt. Here he founded a monastery that became an important centre for the diffusion and development of monasticism. After 45 years as Bishop at Echstatt, Willibald died in c. 786. His relics remain there till this day.

## Prime Ministers from Parish Pump

Britain had its first Prime Minister (PM) in 1721 when Sir Robert Walpole took the job; he was a Whig. In total thus far we have had 81 Prime Ministers; this excludes First Ministers and doesn't count separately an existing PM who wins the election and continues in office. If s/he loses but subsequently wins another term, each term is counted separately.

We have had 56 different people as Prime Ministers.

The longest serving one was Sir Robert Walpole, who was PM for 21 years. In length he was followed by the Tory William Pitt the Younger in 1783, then by Robert Jenkinson, the Earl of Liverpool in 1812, also a Tory. These are the first three of PMs who have served over 7 years.

There were 16 PMs in the 18<sup>th</sup> century, 33 in the 19<sup>th</sup>, 25 in the 20<sup>th</sup> and so far seven in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Labour and the early Tories had slightly more time in office than the number of Prime Ministers *pro rata*. Rishi Sunak is the first British Asian Prime Minister.

# Sea Sunday : 14<sup>th</sup> July

Look around your home. How much of the contents of your bedroom, kitchen, living room and even garage came to you over the seas, via the great merchant ships? What would your home be like without them?



Yet when did you last give a thought to the people who bring them to you?

It is a curious fact that seafarers are one of the most important, and yet invisible, people groups in our society. We depend on them to bring us more than 90% of the world's goods and fuels,

yet we rarely even remember their existence.

It suddenly makes Sea Sunday seem a very good idea: an annual opportunity to give thanks for the 1.89 million seafarers of the world, and to pray for their personal well-being. For going to sea is a lonely occupation. It separates families for up to nine months on end. It is also one of the world's most dangerous occupations, with physically demanding work as well as the threat of piracy, shipwreck and even abandonment.

So this Sea Sunday, let's pause and give thanks to God for the seafarers of the world. Let's remember how their work so enriches our lives. Let's pray for them, for their families, and let's support the organisations that offer them care and support through their chaplaincy work.

One such is The Mission to Seafarers, which has Seafarers Centres in 50 countries, and offers not only practical support such as access to Wi-Fi and a place to relax, but also emotional and spiritual aid through its ordained Port Chaplains, who are constantly visiting the ships.

## All in the month of July

It was:

125 years ago, on 1<sup>st</sup> July 1899 that the Gideons International was founded. The evangelical Christian association places free Bibles in hotel rooms, hospitals, schools, military bases and prisons around the world.

90 years ago, on 4<sup>th</sup> July 1934 that Marie Curie, Polish-born French physicist died. Twice winner of the Nobel Prize for her work on radioactivity. The first woman to win a Nobel prize.

75 years ago, on 27<sup>th</sup> July 1949 that the first successful test flight of the de Havilland Comet, the first commercial passenger jet, took place. The jet went on into production.

Also 75 years ago, on 29<sup>th</sup> July 1949 that the BBC began broadcasting regular weather forecasts on TV.

70 years ago, on 5<sup>th</sup> July 1954 that the BBC launched the first daily television news programme in the UK.

65 years ago, on 25<sup>th</sup> July 1959 that the first hovercraft crossed the English Channel. The SRN-1 had been designed by British inventor Christopher Cockerell.

60 years ago, on 28<sup>th</sup> July 1964 that NASA launched its Ranger 7 space probe on a mission to the Moon. On 31<sup>st</sup> July it sent back the first close-up images of the lunar surface.

40 years ago, on 9<sup>th</sup> July 1984 that York Minster in England was struck by lightning, which set fire to the roof and destroyed the south transept.

20 years ago, on 28<sup>th</sup> July 2004 that Francis Crick, British molecular biologist and biophysicist, died. He was joint winner of the 1962 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for discovering the molecular structure of DNA.

15 years ago, on 5<sup>th</sup> July 2009 that the Staffordshire Hoard was discovered by a metal detectorist in Hammerwich, a village in Staffordshire. It is the largest hoard of Anglo-Saxon gold and silver ever found, and consists of around 4,600 items dating from the 7<sup>th</sup> century.

## RBL Women's Section 80th Anniversary of D-Day Coffee morning and traditional 1940s lunch

The dawn broke in Normandy on 6th June 2024 initially cool, however, sunny which was far-removed from the conditions the combatants endured during Operation Overlord 80 years earlier.



Sue Fenton and the Committee of The **RBL** Women's Section, Croxley Green wanted to remember the sacrifice of so many servicemen whilst celebrating the which resulted outcome in the liberation of France and the rest of Europe and Western laid the foundations of the Allied victory on the Western Front.

The coffee morning and lunch was arranged in recognition of these momentous events. The morning started at 11am with the Exaltation followed by one minute's silence and

the RBL standard was proudly on display.

The ladies of the Women's Section served us tea and coffee which gave us all time to chat and meet up with new and old friends and swop stories.

Our waitresses dressed in the costumes that originally would have been worn, from 1926, by the girls who worked for J. Lyons. Originally a waitress was called a 'Gladys', however from 1926, because the waitresses nipped around



the teashops so quickly, the term 'Nippy' came into use. The name was actually chosen in 1920 following a staff competition. Nippy captured the company's ideal of prompt, efficient, effortless service. Our modern-day 'Nippys' certainly displayed all those qualities.



Miriam led us in prayer before lunch was served at 12pm. Tomato soup followed by a selection of sandwiches that would have been familiar in the 1940s: corned beef, paste, egg thankfully not dried egg, cheese and cucumber. We also enjoyed a small selection of cakes and copious pots of tea. Barbara Loose found a 1940s recipe for bread pudding which she made (with real eggs) for us to try and which was very tasty.

Music, along with song sheets, was put together by Alex Loose and we all joined in singing songs that were popular at the time. Some of us even had a go at the Lambeth Walk but we won't be auditioning for Britain's Got Talent!

There was time for reflection when we heard the experiences of two ladies, sadly no longer with us, and their roles during the run up to Operation Overlord.

Barbara arranged the raffle with the proceeds going towards supporting the Women's Section.

Sue, together with Bob, Wendy, Jenny and Pauline from the Committee organised the event supported by Janet, Carol and Christine. It was a very early start for Sue as she was in the kitchen at 8am. All the ladies, previously mentioned, prepared and served the food. Barbara thanked and congratulated Sue and the ladies for all

their hard work and for making the day so special for us.

The RBL can be a lifeline for both serving and ex-service personnel and their families since it was formed on 15th May 1921, and today they are at the heart of a national network looking after our Armed Forces network.
