

Revd. Canon Miriam writes:

Dear Friends,

Walking with Bodie early in the morning is always a special time for us both. He loves to explore the hedgerows and chase after scents left by foxes, badgers and Muntjacs while I enjoy the quietness of the early morning hour and the joys of all that God has created in all that I see. The beauty of creation is that it is constantly changing, it doesn't stand still. Flowers grow, bloom and then wither, leaves that just a few months ago were bursting from tiny buds are now changing colour as they prepare for autumn, their work completed, the grass that was so lush and green in the spring now brown and tired. The lack of rain over the summer months has had a big impact on the natural environment and whilst we have not been categorised as a drought area, we still need to be mindful of the way we use water so that we conserve the diminishing supplies that we have.

I love the seasons that we have, each brings its own character and sense of hope. Even in the middle of winter the earth is cultivating new life hidden beneath the earth and within the trees preparing them for bursting forth in spring.

As we move towards autumn the church calendar also moves us towards a different church season. At this time of the year, I am always struck by the similarities that the church season has to the natural seasons. Over the coming weeks we will celebrate Harvest, as the daylight hours reduce, we remember loved ones who have died at our All Souls' Service followed by our Patronal festival when we celebrate All Saints'. Remembrance Sunday provides a time of reflection on those who have given and continue to give so much in serving this country. As we move into winter, Advent leads us to Christmas, when hope and expectancy are renewed in us as we celebrate Jesus, the light of the world coming and living among us showing us the way to God.

Just as the natural world begins preparing for spring as soon as leaves fall and flowers die so we are planning a series of events that we hope will bring new life and nurture your journey of faith and spiritual growth over the coming months.

In September we start a series of sermons looking at the Journeys of faith of well-known people in the bible which I wrote about in last month's magazine letter. We will be exploring the journey of faith of Peter, Rahab, Ruth, Amos, Moses, Judas, the Woman at the Well and Paul. I wonder if you might identify with any of these characters in relation to your journey of faith? I wonder how their journey of faith might influence your journey of faith today?

Our Harvest Festival will be on 21st September at 9.45am. Given the ongoing struggle of Rickmansworth food bank to access enough food to give to those in need we will be donating all of the harvest gifts given at this service to support their work. This food bank also provides food for the Croxley Green food bank which is open every Monday afternoon at the Baptist Church. Please see list further on in this magazine for ideas of food to donate.

You are all invited to join our discussion group as we explore 6 Big Questions, over 6 weeks starting on 1st October at 7.30pm, we will be exploring the following;

Why be a Christian? (29th October)

Why go to church? (12th November)

Do come along and join us and bring your questions too. We may not have the answer to every question but we will certainly have fun and learn a lot as we enter into discussions sharing our thoughts and views.

We are running a confirmation class for young people too starting in September, again speak to me if this is something you would like to know more about.

17th September Hildegard, Abbess of Bingen

If you want to make the most of every minute of your life, and to use your various talents to the utmost, then Hildegard is the saint for you.

Born as the tenth child into a nobleman's family in the Nahe valley of the Rhineland during the High Middle Ages, Hildegard stood out from others by the time she was eight. That was when she began to receive supernatural visions from God.

Understandably, her family felt that this sort of thing was beyond them, and so they entrusted her to a woman called Jutta, a female recluse with close ties to the benedictine monastery at Diessenberg. Seven years later, Hildegard became a nun of the community around Jutta, and when Jutta died in 1136, Hildegard became the abbess.

But Hildegard was never going to be one of your quiet nuns tucked away somewhere. Instead, she was always 'out there', and bursting with vitality and energy. She wrote on a wide variety of subjects from theology to medicine, to nature. She composed hymns, chants and songs. And she corresponded with many people, including royalty.

Hildegard was a strong, outspoken woman who saw herself as standing in the biblical prophetic tradition, and as such she was fearless in castigating and reprimanding people whom she saw as needing to repent.

Her supernatural visions of God continued from 1141 to 1151, and with the approval of the Archbishop of Mainz, she recorded many of them. This collection was called *Scivias*, and it dealt with the nature of man of the Last Judgement. When the Pope also approved her visions and writings, Hildegard's fame spread.

In time, Hildegard's community grew so large that it moved to Rupertsberg near Bingen, from where she travelled throughout the Rhineland, speaking and teaching. Above all, Hildegard had a firm focus to her life: Jesus Christ and His redemptive death on the Cross. She was devoted to Him.

All in the month of September *from Parish Pump*

It was:

1,100 years ago, on 4th Sept 925 that England gained her first ever king. He was Aethelstan, King of the Anglo-Saxons (924-927) and then King of England (927-939). Aethelstan was grandson of Alfred the Great, and 30th great-grand uncle to Queen Elizabeth II.

200 years ago, on 27th Sept 1825 that the world's first public railway opened. It was the Stockton and Darlington Railway in north-east England.

150 years ago, on 3rd Sept 1875 that Ferdinand Porsche, Austrian-born German automotive engineer was born. He designed the Volkswagen Beetle and Tiger tank, and founded the Porsche sports car company.

100 years ago, on 7th Sept 1925 that Laura Ashley was born. The Welsh designer and businesswoman was known for her traditional printed fabrics, soft furnishing and women's clothing. Co-founder (along with her husband) of the Laura Ashley textile company and chain of shops. (Died in 1985 when she fell downstairs, aged 60.)

90 years ago, on 3rd Sept 1935 that British driver Malcolm Campbell set a new world land speed record of 301.13 mph in *Bluebird* at Bonneville Salt Flats, Utah. First person to break the 300mph barrier.

70 years ago, on 4th Sept 1955 that Kenneth Kendall became the first newsreader to appear on screen in the UK, reading the *BBC Television News*.

Also 70 years ago, on 22nd Sept 1955 that Britain's first independent TV channel was launched. ITV ended the BBC's monopoly.

Also 70 years ago, 26th Sept 1955 that Bird's Eye frozen fish fingers went on sale in the UK.

50 years ago, on 24th Sept 1975 that Dougal Haston and Doug Scott became the first Britons to reach the summit of Mount Everest. They were also the first climbers from any nation to conquer the south-west face.

30 years ago, on 3rd Sept 1995 that the online auction site eBay was founded (as AuctionWeb). The first item sold was a broken laser pointer.

14th September Holy Cross Day

On Holy Cross Day, the Church celebrates the Cross as a symbol of triumph, as the sign of Christ's victory over death. Holy Cross Day goes right back to 14 September 335, and we have the mother of a Roman Emperor to thank for it.

Helena was a devout Christian, and after her son, Constantine, was converted, they agreed that she should travel from Rome to Israel, and seek out the places of special significance to Christians.

Of course, much of Jerusalem had been destroyed by the Romans around 135 AD. But even so, Helena finally located what she believed to be the sites of the Crucifixion and of the Burial (and modern archaeologists think she may well be correct). The sites were so close together that she built one large church over them - the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

That church, built in honour of the Cross, was dedicated on 14th September 335.

The sign of the Cross has been used by Christians since early times. Tertullian, writing his *De Corona* (3:2) around AD 211, noted that Christians seldom did anything significant without making the sign of the cross.

What is its significance? Well, people often put their initials or some sort of personal mark on something to show that it belongs to them. The Cross is the personal mark of our Lord Jesus Christ, and we mark it on ourselves as a sign that we belong to him. Even in the book of Revelation, we read that the servants of God are 'sealed' or 'marked' on their foreheads as a sign that they are His.

A preacher once put it this way: if you were explaining to someone how to make a cross, you would say: "Draw an I." That is you standing before the Lord, saying, 'here I am'. Then cancel that vertical stroke with a horizontal stroke – as if to say: "Lord, I abandon my self-will and make you the centre of my life instead. I abandon myself to your love and service."


On Holy Cross Day, we recall Jesus' wonderful promise: "And when I am lifted up, I will draw all men unto me." (John 12:32)

Notes from the PCC Meeting on 2nd July 2025

Safeguarding

Anne Oke, the Parish Safeguarding Officer, and Sam Jones, the Assistant Safeguarding Officer, reported on the annual review of the parish Safeguarding Policy, entitled Promoting a Safer Church, on the House of Bishops Safeguarding Policy Statement and on the Action Plan for Level 3 of the Parish Safeguarding Dashboard. The Action Plan covers the actions which are required to be taken, the reasons for these actions and what we must do to carry them out in order to ensure that we adequately safeguard children and vulnerable adults, both Church and non-Church groups using the Church and Hall for activities. These documents were presented to the PCC for adoption and signature and were duly approved.

Specific actions approved by the PCC included appointing Lyndon Palmer as the person responsible for the Church's use of social media and noting specific actions still required under the Action Plan. Revd. Miriam and Revd. Paul commended Anne and Sam for their dedicated work to progress Safeguarding at All Saints', which has ensured that we are fully complying with the Church of England's safeguarding requirements.

Maintenance of the Hall and Committee Room Floors

The PCC considered quotations supplied by Ironwood Flooring for the annual maintenance of the Hall floor, trimming of the expansion gap and fitting of metal ramps to doorways and sanding of the Hall floor and sealing of the Committee Room floor with three coats of lacquer.. The total quoted cost of these three operations was £2,818 plus VAT.

The PCC accepted the quotes for the Hall and Committee Room floors but questioned whether rectifying the expansion gap was the responsibility of the contractor. Correspondence following the meeting provided clarification and the quotation was later accepted.

Church Organ

The PCC was informed that the Church's insurers required a second costed assessment for repairs to the organ following water ingress before settling the Church's claim. A second organ building firm had visited and their report was awaited. The Diocesan Organ Adviser

had also visited and had provided oral advice. His written report was also awaited, for submission to the insurers.

Since the PCC meeting, reports with costed proposals had been requested from two further specialist organ builders. When received they will also be sent to the insurers. Following receipt of the insurers' decision on the Church's claim, the Music Maintenance and Development Committee will consider making appropriate recommendations to the PCC on the way forward. Meanwhile, the source of the water ingress was being investigated.

Beer Festival in October - Purchase of Etched Glasses

The PCC accepted a recommendation from the Social and Fundraising Committee to purchase glasses bearing the Church's name and logo for sale at the Festival and other Church events. It is intended to sell each glass at roughly twice its purchase cost and generate a sizeable profit over several years.

Finance Report

Andrew our Treasurer reported that at the end of June the Church account showed a surplus of income over expenditure of £634 and Hall account income exceeded expenditure by £541. Income from legacies to date totalled £5,502.41.

Buildings Committee - Repairs and Maintenance Works Outstanding

The PCC was asked to approve a schedule of repair works to the church and the Hall agreed with a contractor by Church Surveyor Tony Booth. Members requested other works to be added and these were accepted. The total cost of the works was £4,897.20 plus VAT. Repairs required to the notice boards will be reported to the 3 September PCC Meeting.

Pastoral and Evangelism Group – Mission Action Plan

The Clergy Team is examining all the comments received as feedback from the Afternoon Tea on 17th May and exploring ways to take forward the parish's missional role, both spiritual and practical. Spiritual initiatives included the Hope Explored course in June and July; practical steps included encouragement of volunteering for the August Pop-up Cafés and for serving refreshments after the Sunday morning service.

Personal approaches to invite individuals to come to services and events could be productive.

Thanks from Revd. Tolu

Revd. Tolu expressed her warmest thanks on behalf of herself and her family to everyone for welcoming them into the All Saints' community, supporting her by their attendance and prayers at her ordination on 27th June and at the service and celebration lunch on 28th June. She also thanked the congregation for their most generous gift presented to her at the lunch.


