

Revd. Canon Miriam writes:

Dear Friends,

I am writing this a few days after our wonderful Christmas Market. It was such a joyful event with hundreds of people coming along and enjoying all that was available. From yummy cakes and

savoury rolls to Tombola fun (traditional, chocolate and children's), handmade bags and cards to children's activities and then the amazing stalls that were full of all sorts of crafts from our external stall holders. There was so much to enjoy as we browsed and listened to music by the brilliant band Night Train and the joyful voices of the children from the Centre Stars group that meet each week in our Hall. We raised in the region of £7,500 for Church funds which was amazing. Thank you to everyone who helped in any way, it is so greatly appreciated.

Being an active part of the community is something that All Saints' does well. Both the Christmas Market and the Beer Festival are just two examples of the fantastic opportunities we provide at All Saints' to engage with local people in a really positive way. Meeting people 'where they are at' enables us to gently walk alongside them as we share God's love, presence and acceptance in ways that are sometimes through spoken word, sometimes through the warm welcome and generous hospitality that we provide or simply by just 'being there'.

During December there are many more opportunities to continue with our ethos of generous hospitality as we warmly welcome people into our Church. We have five schools who will attend Church for their school Carol Services along with their parents, grandparents and carers. We have our Christingle Service on 14th December at 4pm, our Afternoon Tea on 18th December at 2pm (please book your place with Jude in the office 01923 772109) our Carol Service on 21st December at 6pm and Crib Service on 24th December at 4pm. These services and activities are great opportunities to invite families, friends and neighbours to come along with you to share in the celebration of the most incredible gift that God has given to us, Jesus, His Son, born as a baby to experience life on earth with all its ups and downs and to show us the way to God.

Not all our engagement with the local community happens in our Church or Hall buildings. We will once again be running a Mulled Wine stall at the Parish Council Christmas Market on Saturday 6th December from 2.30 -6.30pm. Do drop by if you are able and don't forget to pop into the Methodist Church Christmas Tree Festival on your way!

Christmas is a busy and sometimes stressful time which can leave us exhausted. Remember to take time to 'just be'. It was into a busy, stressed and challenging world that Jesus was born. There was no time or opportunity for Mary to have meticulous plans in place as she prepared for Jesus' birth. Instead, she had to make do with a dirty stable and her husband Joseph with maybe a local person to help her through her labour. It wasn't ideal. I am sure that she wanted to be able to give and do so much more to ensure the safety and comfort for this special child she was carrying, the Messiah. But the reality is God comes at the time we least expect Him, and in our chaos and busyness, our worries and anxieties, our hopes and our dreams He enfolds us in His arms and fills us with His love, grace, peace and acceptance.

One of my favourite Christmas Carols is In the Bleak Midwinter written by Christina Rossetti (1830-1894). I particularly love the words of the final verse which moves our focus from all that God has given to us through Jesus to what we can give in return. God doesn't ask us for great things, He simply asks us to give Him our heart, to allow Him to be born anew within us, so that in and through us He can continue His work here on earth. Perhaps you might like to reflect on these words during Advent, maybe use them as a part of your daily prayers as you step back from the busyness of the coming weeks to prepare yourself spiritually to celebrate the birth of Jesus.

What can I give him, poor as I am?
If I were a shepherd,
I would bring a lamb,
If I were a wise man
I would do my part —
Yet what I can I give him,
Give my heart.

Musical Memories Afternoon

Organised by Croxley Parish Nursing Team

On 14th November we had the second Musical Memories Afternoon. It was such a gloomy wet afternoon outside with so much rain water laying on the surface, but inside the Baptist Church Hall it was bright with the embroidered table cloths, colourful serviettes, lovely flower decorations and all the smiles which lit up the room with laughter and singing.

Over 70 people attended, which included people living with memory loss and dementia, and their carers. Cathy introduced the session with the order of the afternoon and various housekeeping information. The first choir, The Watford Philharmonic Voices, sang songs from the "1930 Swing Era in the USA" which included Continental,



Somewhere over the Rainbow sung by Judy Garland in the film The wizard of Oz in 1939 and Glen Miller numbers. Then they did a medley of the Beatles songs and Bring me Sun Shine made

famous by Morecambe and Wise which everyone happily joined in with.

This was followed by Afternoon Tea, a selection of delicious sandwiches and a variety of wonderful homemade cakes with a cuppa to drink. This gave everyone a chance to have a chat. Many comments were made about how they really enjoyed the tea with the variety of sandwiches and cake.

Our last session was with Michael and the St. Oswald's Choir. Everyone had a song sheet so they could sing along to various songs including Old MacDonald, The Hills are Alive and Beside the Seaside. Looking around the room, everyone was singing along, clapping and swaying with the music, thoroughly enjoying themselves. One lady was imitating playing the piano and she had obviously been a very good player.

During the afternoon we were also fortunate to be joined by Ursula from the Association of Reflexology who is one of our Parish Nurse Volunteers. She offered gentle Hand Massages which help provide stress relief and promote the body's own feelings bringing balance to the body. Many enjoyed the massage saying how relaxing it was.

There was much positive feedback about how enjoyable the afternoon had been with the music, singing and tea! Again, several asked, when is the next one? It was also commented by several couples how good it was to be able to go out somewhere together, rather than just sitting at home on their own. They enjoyed being in a safe place with such good company and entertainment, and thought the tea was delicious. One comment



by a husband to his wife when they were ready to go home, as she held the bunch of flowers, was that she looked just like a bride and she gave such a lovely smile.

There are 1,000,000 people living with memory loss or dementia in the UK – though as yet there is no cure, music does seem to help. Songs can bring back treasured memories and provide powerful well-being benefits for people living with memory loss or dementia. This was proved this afternoon by the many smiles.

So I must now say a big thank you to everyone who helped make this event possible and run so smoothly: The Baptist Church for providing the venue, St. Oswald's Church for providing the music, The Methodist, St. Bedes and All Saints' Churches for making the delicious spread, the washer-uppers, Sue Pope for putting together the flower posies, and all the volunteers who have contributed to making the afternoon so successful.

It is a privilege and our pleasure to organise such events which you all so obviously enjoyed. Here's to the next one!

A footnote:

Croxley is one of five locations in Hertfordshire to pilot a new Accreditation Scheme for shops and organisations to become Dementia Friendly (and memory-loss supportive). Our Parish Nurse, Cathy, has led on this, working closely with Memory Support Hertfordshire — Local connection, information and advice for everyone affected by dementia and memory loss. The Croxley Parish Nursing Service received funding from the Lottery Community Fund for one day a week over three years to develop dementia/memory loss initiatives within the Croxley Green community.

This funding ends next year. There is still much to be done to enable a dementia-friendly (and memory-loss supportive) community in Croxley. The Trustees hope to raise further funding to continue this work. Restoration of the Organ

The week beginning 27th October saw something in church not seen for nearly 40 years. The organ opened up and many of its nearly 1600 pipes laid out in the north nave as a programme of restoration was begun by organ builders Cousans of Coalville in Leicestershire.

The last time the instrument received serious therapy was in the late 1980s. Since then, the instrument has steadily declined although its increasing loss of stops and notes has been skilfully disguised in recent years by our organists David and Simon who have worked round its idiosyncracies. About a year ago, things made a serious downturn...one of the organ's three keyboards (manuals) -- the choir -- simply stopped working. Investigation by Cousans, a long-established firm of organ builders, revealed that the fault was damage caused by water that had at some point leaked from a hole in the roof above it. They took the opportunity to carry out a thorough survey of the organ, including the console, and quoted to repair the water damage and also to restore the pipework and replace the transmission, now very old, and badly in need of repair, as described above.

The church insurers asked for a second quote to repair the water-damage, and the PCC took an opportunity to carry out a thorough investigation of the options for the future of the church's organ music, taking advice from the Diocesan organ adviser, Christopher Muhley, three more pipe organ builders and three suppliers of electronic organs. They were anxious to cover all the bases, so to speak. The upshot of a considerable amount of work was for the immediate future to repair the water damage, largely paid for by the insurers, playing for time to consider the rather longer term. The cost of a full restoration will be considerable and while hardly perfect we should be able to enjoy a much improved instrument.

While we are at it, it may be worth taking the chance of saying a little about the organ's history. How did we get to where we are today? John Norton's design for All Saints' Church back in 1872 did not include an organ but there was space for an organ 'loft' on the north side of the chancel under the tower for one. In the first years after consecration, however, instrumental music to support the singing of choir and congregation was provided by a harmonium.

Patented in 1840 it was an instrument played through a keyboard with the sound produced by pumping air past metal reeds. It had become extremely popular in homes and in smaller churches where the lack of volume compared with a pipe organ was not a problem, indeed possibly an advantage.

Two years into our first vicar, Astley Roberts' ministry, however, the church took advantage of Norton's design feature in the north transept and, following a successful public appeal, bought a pipe organ. It was built by the partnership of Bishop & Starr, and installed in 1875. Having a pedal and two manuals (Swell and Great Organs). it seems to have had somewhere between 800 and 900 pipes. The organ fund account records the payment to Messrs. Bishop of £303, 13s 6p. Serving the church well for 70 years, it was destroyed by enemy action when two German parachute mines fell close to the church on the night of 23rd September 1940.

Happily, a replacement was found, though only intended to be a temporary arrangement. It had originally been built in 1895/96 for Christ Church Luton by Nicholson & Co. of Worcester, and later enlarged. It was moved to All Saints' in 1943, the work being done again by Bishop and Son. who also incorporated in it pipes from a Hunter organ originally installed in St. Ethelburga at Bishopsgate in the late 1700s. A large instrument to begin with, it was now too large to fit into Norton's organ chamber and instead was placed in the west end of the south nave near 'the shrine' War Memorial. It was judged not an entirely satisfactory instrument. This was partly because it had been originally planned with fronts to two openings. In particular, it left much to be desired architecturally. A number of members of the congregation remember it being there, 'a rather dark and looming presence'.

In summer 1968, in preparation for the All Saints' centenary in 1972, Robert Slater & Son were asked to report on the state of the instrument and make recommendations to create an organ 'more worthy' of the church. In the event, a **virtually new organ** had to be constructed as it became clear that much of the structure, both timbers and wind chests, had been seriously damaged by 'dry heat' probably in the original environment. Of a total of 1608 pipes in the rebuilt instrument, only 450 could be salvaged from the existing instrument. The rest of the pipes were provided by Slater's from

stock or built by them.

The instrument was moved back to the position the first organ had occupied, the chamber on the NE side of the 'old' (north) nave. Changing the action from tubular- to electro-pneumatic allowed the console to be separated from the pipes and placed between the piers opposite the organ chamber, between the north and south chancels, and at a slight oblique angle to the line of the piers, which is where it remains. This was judged a very good position for hearing the organ and with clear sightlines to both the south sanctuary and the choir stalls in the south nave. From this position, the organist was/is hidden from the view of most of the congregation. John Palmer, Head of Music at Lady Spencer-Churchill College of Education, Wheatley, in Oxfordshire played the restored organ at the inaugural concert.

In the 1980s, there were moves to further improve the instrument. The organist and choirmaster at the time was John Wyatt, who later moved to St Augustine's, Kilburn. The assistant organist was John Iveson (father of Vicky). An appeal was launched. The work was carried out in 1986/87 by MJ (Michael) Broom, the organ's tuner and voicer. 50/60 new pipes were added including an 8' open principal and a great deal of other work carried out. The cost was £9,624. In today's terms using national inflation figures this would probably be close to £25,000 although how relevant the inflation figures are to

work on organs can only be guessed at. On 20th September 1987, the restored organ introduced to a standing room only audience by the extremely celebrated organist **Nicolas** Kynaston, organist of Westminster Catholic Cathedral. Entry was by programme only at £2 a head. In 1988 Michael made further improvements.

He also proposed constructing a new draw stop console with solid-state action and a new pedal board with 50 notes. These latter amounted to rebuilding both the console and action, close to what are identified as the present-day

needs by Cousans. An equivalent cost today would probably have been around £44,000, almost exactly that suggested by Cousans. In the event, none of that work was carried out. There was no appetite for the major fund-raising effort needed. A major review reporting to the PCC in 2018 produced no change in the decision of 30 years earlier and the instrument has continued its downward path. That path will now be halted and reversed by the work carried out by Cousans and which is intended to have been completed ready for the coming Christmas.

Notes from the PCC Meeting: 5th November 2025

Church Organ

The organ wind chest, which was damaged by water ingress from the roof, has been removed for repairs, together with the swell box. It is planned to reinstate them before Christmas. The leaking roof has been sealed and no further water ingress has occurred.

Safeguarding

Safeguarding Officer, Anne Oke, reported that all PCC members and all leaders of Church activities must complete their Church of England safeguarding training. This can be done via the C of E Safeguarding Portal. Safeguarding training includes a course on Awareness of Domestic Abuse. Activity group leaders must have updated their training in order to be covered by the Church's insurance policy. They should also check that the risk assessments for their activities are up to date.

In connection with All Saints' Safeguarding Sunday on 23rd November, congregation members were given a 'traffic light' questionnaire to complete, to seek to assess their gut feelings about how effectively our parish is safeguarding children and vulnerable adults. Revd. Miriam and the Safeguarding Team are assessing the responses received. She said that anyone who was aware of someone at risk had a duty to report it to the Safeguarding Team of Miriam, Anne or Sam Jones in person or by email to: safeguarding @croxleygreenallsaints.org.

We are seeking an additional member of the Safeguarding Team. If you are interested or would like further information please speak to Miriam, Anne or Sam.

Finance Report

Our Treasurer, Andrew Nobbs, reported that the parish accounts to the end of October showed surpluses of £2,644 on the Church account and £7,822 on the Hall account; a total surplus of £10,466. Andrew warned that a new contract for the telephone mast due in 2026 might result in substantially lower income from the mast. More information should be available by March 2026.

Charities Nominations

PCC members were invited to nominate charities which might be supported during 2026 from donations for post-service refreshments.

PCC members will be sent a list of nominated charities from which four will be chosen at the PCC's meeting on 3rd December. Fran Bennett is co-ordinating nominations.

Reports from Committees: Buildings

Recent rainfall has again produced a threat of water ingress into the office and the Hall. The Committee is seeking quotations for remedial works for a drain at the rear of the Hall.

Hall: The Afternoon Tea on 1st November raised enough funds to purchase curtains for the Committee Room. We are deeply grateful to Sue Fenton, Alex and Barbara Loose and Bob Sheminant who organised the event. The Committee is investigating areas of worn varnish on the Hall floor.

Pastoral and Evangelism: Volunteers are needed for the five schools' Carol Services in December. All helpers should wear All Saints' identity badges.

Social and Fundraising: Beer Festival and Christmas Market

Net income from the Beer Festival was £3,239, including a generous donation from the Anchor, Tap & Bottle and sales of food and glasses. In addition, £1,163 was made from Prize Draw ticket sales which will be included in the results for the Christmas Market held on 15th November. Warmest thanks are due to everyone who took part in these events, particularly to Scott McGarvie of the Anchor, Tap & Bottle, Ben Guest and Sam Beard for their work.


